# Did you know?

Oregon's first constitution, passed in 1857, declared Oregon a free state, but denied African-Americans the right to live in the state?



Until the passing of Oregon's first civil rights legislation in 1953, hotels, motels, restaurants and amusement parks could discriminate on the basis of race, religion or national origin?

Before the Fair Housing Act was amended in 1988, more than 60% of the state's rental units were off-limits to families with children?

### Space Requirements:
